#### Love My Daughter by Warrick King

#### Background;

Two and a half weeks out for major surgery, my daughter asked me if I could make a wooden toy for our great grandson for his first birthday. As I had previously set the mark by making a wooden toy for each of our grandchildren, I could not let her down.

#### Design;

The question was put; could I make a Noah's ark?

Researching Google and the Club library I found a picture of an ark to give me an idea of proportions and shape.

I needed to develop a mock-up plan using cardboard and masking tape and then receive the approval of the ark design to go ahead.

#### **Design Parameters:**

LLength – 400mm L x 210mm W x 200mm H

TThe design includes a base, a mid-deck and a top cabin with a hinged lid (to store animals). MMaterials; a sheet of 1200mm x 600mm x 7mm marine plywood for structure, jacaranda for bow and stern shapes.

BBrass hinges for top lid.

#### **Construction:**

The base and deck formed the body of the ark. The front and back of the ark was shaped using a segmental construction to keep the weight down. I used a 2" sanding disc to blend the front and back nose of the ark. One side of the body incorporated a drop downside door which acted as a ramp in the open position. The door hinge was made from 1.6mm wire retained within the side of the hull. A simple ramp / latch was made from a wooden paddle pop stick.

The top deck cabin was a simple box design, mitered joints with a hinged pitch roof on one end. The roof area can also be used as a storage box for the animals when not in play.

#### The Animals:


The animals needed to be of a suitable size so that children could pick up as well as identify the animal shape. I found suitable animal shapes, so these were copied and glued to 6-7mm jacaranda board. As animals were required to be in pairs, a second red cedar board was fixed to the underside of the jacaranda board using double side tape. The contrast in the wood colors was ideal for a matching pair.

As time was running out for the completion of this project, fellow Club members' John Bright and Graham McDougall took on the task to produce the animals using the clubs scroll saws. After sawing, the final shape animals were split on the double-sided tape resulting in having two separate animals, one in jacaranda and a second in red cedar.

I chose to finish the ark with two coats of semi-gloss acrylic lacquer and left the animals as natural timber.




#### Carpet trim creates a hidden wall hanger

To hang a pair of heavy mirrors, I used aluminum carpet trim as a French cleat. Attach one piece to the wall (be sure to screw it into the studs) and the other to whatever you are hanging. The metal trim pieces hold their cargo close to the wall, which helps to keep them hidden from view.

#### What Tree is That?

#### River Red Gum Eucalyptus camaldulensis

Eucalyptus camaldulensis, commonly known as the river red gum is a tree that is endemic to Australia. It has smooth white or cream-coloured bark, lance-shaped or curved adult leaves, flower buds in groups of seven or nine, white flowers and hemispherical fruit with the valves extending beyond the rim. A familiar and iconic tree, it is seen along many watercourses across inland Australia, providing shade in the extreme temperatures of central Australia.

#### **Distribution and habitat:**

River red gum has the widest natural distribution of any eucalyptus species. It is commonly found along waterways and there are only a few locations where the species is found away from a water course. They prefer soils with clay content. The trees not only rely on rainfall but also on regular flooding, since flooding recharges the sub-soil with water.


The trees provide a breeding habitat for fish during the flooding season, which also benefits aquatic bird life that depend on fish as a food source during their own breeding season.

#### **Uses:**

Red gum is so named for its brilliant red wood, which can range from a light pink through to almost black, depending on the age and weathering. It is somewhat brittle and is often cross-grained, making hand working difficult. Traditionally used in rot resistant applications like stumps, fence posts and sleepers, more recently it has been recognized in craft furniture for its spectacular deep red colour and typical fiddleback figure. It needs careful selection, as it tends to be quite reactive to changes in humidity (moves about a lot in service). It is quite hard, dense can take a fine polish and carves well. It is a popular timber for woodturners, particularly if old and well-seasoned.

The burls are particularly in high demand by the turning fraternity and also make stunning boxes.

NOTE: The limbs of river red gums, sometimes whole trees, often fall without warning so that camping or picnicking near them is dangerous, especially if a tree has dead limbs or the tree is under stress and is often referred to as 'Widow makers'.

#### **Men's Sheds Visits 2**

Mount Beauty, Victoria:

A lovely little Men's Shed set on the shores of the 'Pondage' in the Victorian high country at Mount Beauty. I went for a wander around town and found it on Monday but it was all closed up, went for a bit of a hike on Tuesday and the doors were open. A lovely man took me on a tour and shared lots of information.

The club has about 50 members but many just come for a chat and a cuppa. It is accessible 7 days a week as they have a combination lock (electronic) and a security system with cameras in all areas that can be viewed externally as well as in the club.

They have a large woodworking area with one of each piece of equipment including a CNC machine, a metal workshop, blacksmith space and electrical workshop. Many of their members are ex-hydro workers, hence the metal and electrical sections.


They make items to sell, such as the glasses holder – hardwood base (pictured). They also sell the Christmas trees (pictured) and do up furniture for the local Op Shop.

They bag the timber offcuts and sell them as kindling for \$10 a bag which gets them about \$5,000 a year in income.

They have a great way of displaying old tools etc donated to them (pictured), possibly a better idea than our glass shelves.

They are called to morning tea by an old fire siren – rather loud.

They also had a concertina to store things(concertina), unfortunately our floor wouldn't hold the weight. We talked about the quality of work at RDWS and he said he had seen a Men's Shed do a display at their local Art Gallery – can't remember where though... but a great idea to promote their club.





#### The Redcliffe and District Woodcraft Society Inc. - General Information

The aim of our society is to promote, encourage and practice the art of woodcraft and similar arts. Workshops in woodturning, woodcarving, scroll sawing, pyrography, box making, musical instrument making, toy making, general woodworking, and timber preparation are held in the Woodcraft Centre at 463 Oxley Avenue, Redcliffe. The Society is administered by a Management Committee of eleven members who report to the general membership.

Members meet on Tuesdays for general workshop activities and our weekly "show and Tell' at morning tea where members can show and discuss their creations and be inspired by the work of others. Our Club is also open to members on Monday, Wednesday, and Thursday mornings.

The Society has a large range of tools and machinery for members to use and offers regular tuition in different aspects of woodcraft. Our club also conducts a comprehensive system of competency in the operations of its machinery. ALL NEW MEMBERS ARE WELCOME
